Supporting Wildfire Relief in Maui



On August 8, 2023, a wildfire devastated the historic town of Lahaina in Maui, Hawaii, killing 100 people and causing thousands more to lose their homes. In December, more than four months after the disaster, 6,300 of Maui's wildfire survivors were still living in hotels contracted by the Red Cross and FEMA.

Peace Winds' Response

On August 16, a Peace Winds team arrived in Maui to aid survivors and assess the needs on the ground. Peace Winds staff distributed relief supplies at temporary shelters and gathered in-kind donations for wildfire-affected pets and pet owners.

Since then, with more than \$250,000 from donors in Japan and around the world, Peace Winds has shifted its focus from short-term relief to supporting the long-term recovery process. We began partnering with local Hawaiian organizations, providing funding and inkind psychosocial support, and meeting the needs of Maui's homeless pets. To date, Peace Winds has supported the following initiatives:

- Nā Keiki O Emalia works with trauma survivors to offer support groups, ageappropriate children's books about grief, daycare spaces, and community events with psychosocial support resources. To make these activities possible, NKOE is providing facilitator training for staff and volunteers.
- Hospice Maui is a hospice center that offers grief support. The organization offers workshops on trauma-informed care and self-care to the counselors, social workers, teachers, call center staff, hospital staff, and first responders who are working tirelessly to support Maui's wildfire survivors.

- Hawaii Animal Rescue Foundation
 houses homeless pets, provides them
 with veterinary care, adopts them to
 loving homes, and works to reunite
 families with their missing animals.

 Peace Winds is contributing to the high
 cost of vet care and providing the shelter
 with some of its most needed supplies.
- Emergency relief supplies, including food, water, hygiene items, and baby goods were distributed at temporary shelters by Peace Winds staff during the initial days. Pet food, leashes, collars, and crates were also provided for Maui's wildfire-affected pets.
